Finally, Layla landed in a puddle and met some playful tadpoles swimming around.

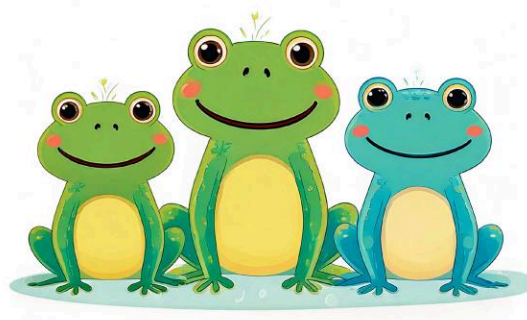
“Where did you come from?” they asked.

One evening, Nicholas said, "Thank you for sharing your stories with me. They've helped me dream about amazing places and taught me new words."

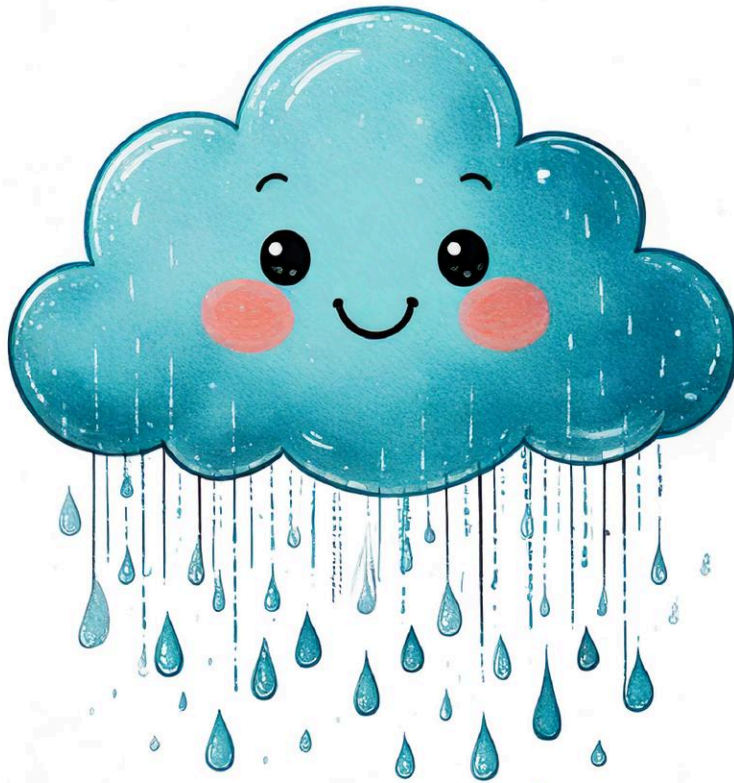


Leo smiled and said, "Words are like seeds, Nicholas. When you read them, they grow in your imagination, helping you dream and create new worlds."

only brought bad weather and gloom.

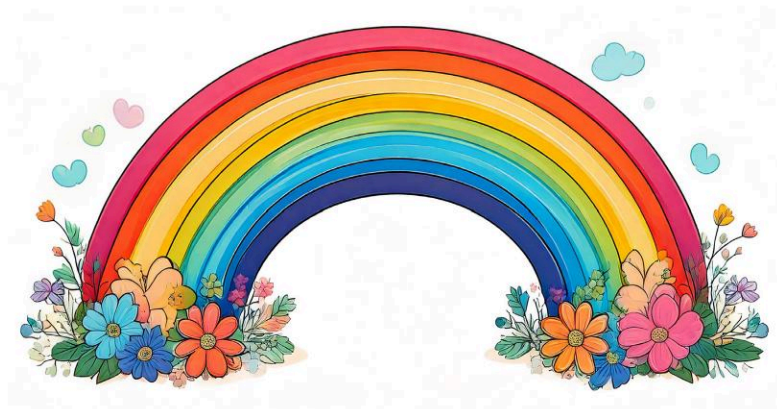
One hot day, while floating in the sky, Claire saw

One by one, the mice pushed the rock. It was hard at first, but little by little, the rock moved. Even the smallest mice joined in.

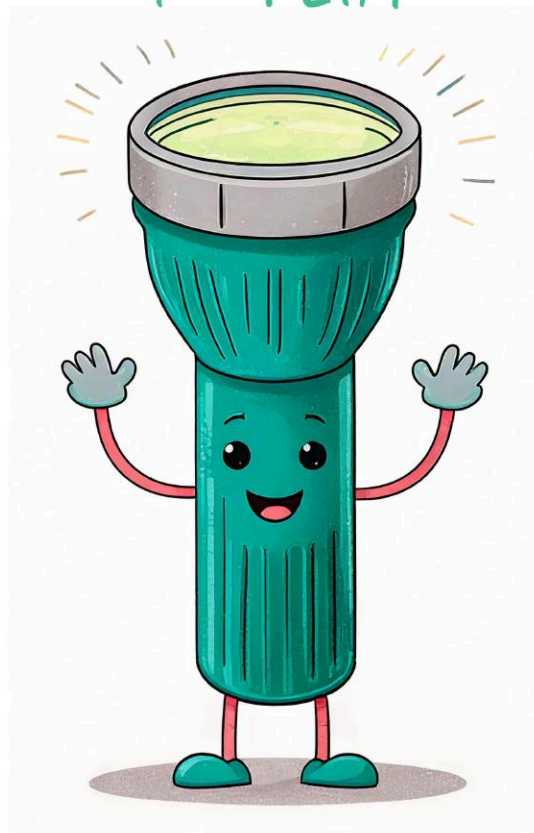
Together, they pushed the rock out of the way, and their burrow was safe again.

One day, he saw a group of ants getting ready for a race.

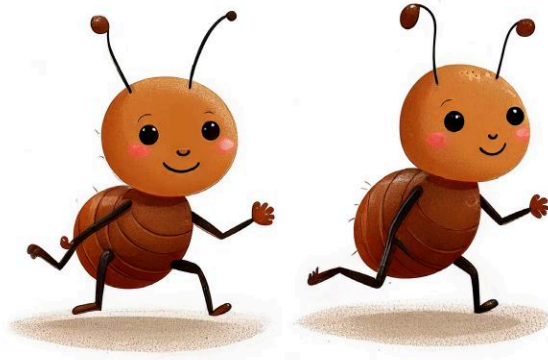
“Can I join the race?” Benjamin asked excitedly.

Instead of feeling afraid, Valentino was excited.

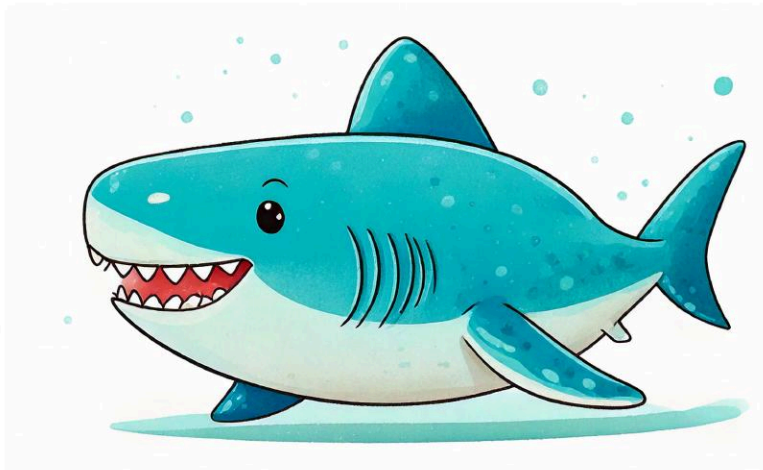
“I’m going to explore the ocean!”

"Let me help you fix it!"

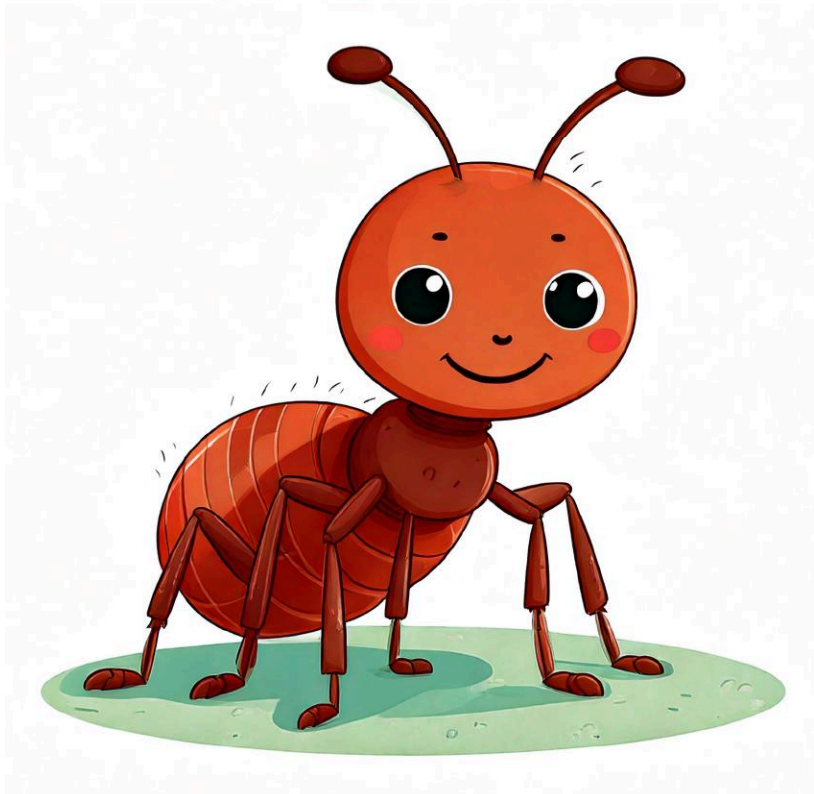
Emmett, seeing Marian's sincere apology, forgave her. Together, they fixed the toy and became good friends.
